Key Health and Safety Advice After Hurricane Melissa

Please take these precautions to protect your health and wellbeing, as well as that of your family and colleagues.

1. Mosquito Prevention and Control

Inspect and clean your surroundings regularly. Cover, clean, or punch holes in containers that hold water to prevent mosquito breeding. These actions help reduce the risk of dengue and other mosquito-borne diseases.

2. Handwashing and Hygiene

Wash hands thoroughly with soap and safe water, especially after handling debris, animals, meat, or using the restroom. Maintaining good hygiene prevents the spread of infections and communicable diseases.

3. Food and Water Safety

Store food and water safely to avoid contamination. Boil or treat water before use, and discard any food that has come into contact with floodwater.

Water Treatment Example: Add 8 drops of bleach to 5 litres (1 US gallon) of water, mix well, and let it stand for one hour before use.

4. Injury Prevention and Safety

When doing repairs or cleanup, wear protective gear such as gloves, boots, long sleeves, masks, and helmets. Avoid

wading through floodwaters, which may contain sharp debris, contaminants, or sources of infection such as leptospirosis.

5. Mental Wellbeing

Recovery can be emotionally challenging. It's okay not to feel okay. Take breaks, rest when needed, and seek support if you feel overwhelmed.

6. Mold Prevention and Control

Inspect homes and workplaces for water damage. Dry and clean damp areas promptly to prevent mold growth, which can cause respiratory and allergic reactions. Use suitable cleaning solutions and ensure proper ventilation.

Together, we will recover with resilience and care. Please continue to prioritize health, safety, and wellbeing for yourselves, your families, and your teams.

After a storm or hurricane it is normal to feel overwhelmed by stress. This stress can appear in many forms and bring with it a range of emotions such as fear, sadness, frustration, disappointment, anxiety, anger, or even hopelessness. While we cannot always control the emotions that arise, we can choose how we respond to them. Rebuilding both emotionally and physically takes time, patience, and support. The following suggestions can help guide you on that journey:

Steps to Rebuilding

- **Put first things first.** Focus on the essentials: food, shelter, clothing, medical care, and necessary supplies.
- **Clean up and protect your property.** Salvage what you can and secure what remains.
- **Make the best of a bad situation.** Develop a positive plan for the future. Explore your options, use wisdom, and avoid dwelling on negativity.
- **Be productive.** Engage in tasks that match your abilities and strengths. Purposeful activity can ease emotional strain.
- **Lend a helping hand.** Supporting others in greater need: by running errands,



offering financial help, or opening your home. This can bring healing to both them and you.

- **Choose peace over panic.** Visualize two paths: one leading to panic, the other to peace. Focus your thoughts on the road that keeps you calm.
- **Be patient with yourself.** Healing takes time. Grieving is difficult and deeply personal. Allow yourself grace and take one day, one task at a time.
- **Talk about your experiences.** Sharing your story can help you process emotions, connect with others, and promote mutual healing.

- **Seek professional help when needed.** You don't have to face trauma alone. Counseling and therapy can be powerful tools in recovery.

Understanding Trauma and PTSD

Some disaster survivors may experience symptoms of Post-Traumatic Stress:

- Nightmares or flashbacks
- Insomnia or trouble sleeping
- Difficulty concentrating
- Short-term memory loss

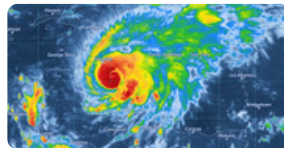

Jamalco Spared the Fury of Hurricane Melissa

Jamalco has emerged relatively unscathed from the impact of Hurricane Melissa, which battered the island on October 28. While the storm had devastating effects in other parishes, particularly in the western region, Clarendon was spared the brunt of the hurricane's impact.

According to Managing Director, Marvin

Jackson, the company's preparation was instrumental in mitigating the potential damage. "We are relieved that the hurricane drifted to the west, which removed Clarendon from the direct impact of the storm's worst effects," Mr. Jackson said. "Although we had prepared sufficiently, the magnitude of Hurricane Melissa would have been devastating."

The company's preparations included developing a comprehensive hurricane checklist, holding regular meetings with leadership, and assembling a special team to effect repairs. The team took several key measures to secure the facility, including

All major mechanical components, the turbine, generator, and gearbox have been successfully placed on their respective foundations, marking an important step in the installation process. The mechanical alignment of these three components has commenced under the guidance of the manufacturer's technical representative, ensuring precise calibration and optimal performance once the system is operational.

High Voltage & Power Distribution Manager, Mark Peterkin confirmed that the construction of the TG4 building is now 80 percent complete, with work continuing on the remaining

removing and storing critical equipment, such as the Conveyor J belt and roller bed sections, and strategically deploying sandbags to prevent flooding.

Additionally, the company repaired all leaks, placed compressors and diesel generators on standby, and had a dedicated team of craftsmen on site throughout the hurricane to address any issues that might arise.

Acting Senior Manager, Refinery Operations, **Art Banton**, said post-storm assessments of the refinery, Residue Storage Areas (RSA), and port facilities revealed no major damage. He praised the

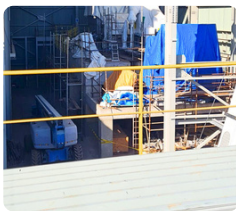
"employees' efforts, saying, "we fared well, and the special team of employees worked tirelessly to tackle the minor issues that arose. The quick action on the part of team members expressed my major issues."

With the storm now passed, Jamalco is focused on resuming normal operations. Unit 1 and 2 digesters are back online, signaling the commencement of alumina production.

In praising the team's efforts, Mr. Jackson expressed his gratitude, saying, "You are the epitome of hard work and devotion. Your tenacity and commitment are greatly appreciated!"

structural elements. Meanwhile, teams have begun the installation of the turbine's lubrication oil piping and the structural towers that will support the cable trays for the generator's electrical systems.

The project team remains focused on maintaining strong momentum toward its next phases of electrical and mechanical integration, which will pave the way for commissioning in early 2026.

Once completed, TG4 will enhance the powerhouse's overall efficiency and reliability, reinforcing Jamalco's commitment to operational excellence and sustainable energy performance.

Jamalco Creates Literacy and Numeracy Labs at Bustamante High School

Jamalco's Leadership Team Harmonizes for Success

In a powerful display of collaboration and commitment, Jamalco's leadership team, convened for the second Strategic Vision Engagement Session of 2025. Managing Director, **Marvin Jackson**, and the directors highlighted the company's achievements in Q2 and Q3 of 2025.

Mr. Jackson's opening remarks emphasized the importance of clear communication and collective ownership. "Management is our responsibility, and we need to sing the same tune," he declared. He called for a cultural shift, where information flows seamlessly, and everyone takes ownership of their part. "When we make a plan, it's our plan. We are all a part of the process," he stressed.

Continuing, Mr. Jackson urged everyone to "be accountable, play your part and trust each other. Stop watching each other, you know your role and what you have to do, so just do it." He underscored the need for teamwork and a cohesive approach to drive success, stating, "We are all in this together, and accountability is our foundation."

The team celebrated numerous achievements, including impressive safety

records, operational milestones, strategic advancements, and record disbursements of education support to employees and the community. Some notable highlights include:

- **Health, Safety, and Environment:** Zero DARTS and a remarkable ROWS level of 132 feet, three consecutive months of zero incidents, and successfully earned the prestigious ASI certification.
- **Mines and Lands:** Bauxite stockpiles reaching 240,000 tonnes and total inventory at 500,000 CWT at CAW.
- **Refinery operations:** Surpassed plan for digester flow, while also identifying opportunities for further improvements to meet production targets by year's end. The session also provided a platform for open discussion, where the team identified areas for improvement, including operational reliability, clearer communication regarding salary adjustments, and faster approval pro-

-cesses. Strategic issues such as land titling for the Denhig Krawle subdivision were also discussed, alongside opportunities to streamline maintenance systems and reinforce leadership synergy.

Mr. Jackson reminded the team that "equipment doesn't fail themselves, we fail them," stressing the need for greater responsibility and proactive leadership.

Upgrades on Boiler 5 Successfully Completed

The overhaul addressed a key constraint caused by insufficient combustion air flow to the burners, which had limited the boiler's ability to deliver its rated capacity. The solution involved a comprehensive overhaul of the rotary air heater, installation of new burners, gas infrastructure, seals, and heating elements. These improvements will optimize heat exchange, reduce air short-circuiting, and increase steam production.

According to Maintenance Director, **Joseph Williams**, "This upgrade will enable us to increase steam generation supply, sustaining higher alumina production and power generation. In addition, if there are planned or unplanned outages on one of the steam generators, steam supply to the Refinery and for power generation will not be impacted." We will also enjoy improved energy efficiency and lower energy costs." Jamalco's investment in this improvement work demonstrates our commitment to improving cost and sustainability of the business.

Boiler 4, which is scheduled for a similar upgrade, is slated for commissioning in November. Upon completion, the refinery will have a steam generation capacity of 1,200,000 pounds per hour. The increased capacity will enable us to respond more effectively to fluctuations in demand, while maintaining our commitment to quality and reliability.

The project was undertaken by a combination of local contractors and Zeeco, an external contractor. "I'm proud of the team's efforts in delivering critical upgrade," said Mr. Williams. "We are excited about the benefits this will bring to our organization."

The Burners for Boilers 4 & 5 were upgraded to dual fired burners (gas and oil) last year to improve the Refinery's agility.

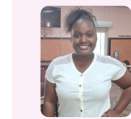

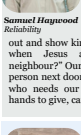
